
**K9 Program** The following was submitted by Chief Farally:

Dear Pitcairn Business and Residents:

The Pitcairn Police Department has been blessed with years of support from the people and businesses that have made this borough so special. We believe this year alone has shown the importance of working together as a community to improve the lives of all. The Pitcairn Police Department wants to assure all citizens that, no matter the circumstance, we will always be here to serve you through our core values of service, integrity, respect and resourcefulness. We are excited to share with you another opportunity our department has taken to continue to fulfill our mission. Our department has implemented a K9 program for our community. The decision to do so is simply due to the large number of cases where K9 teams have been instrumental and vital opportunities still need met. We are reaching out to ask for your support in raising funds for our K-9 Unit. The addition of a trained and certified dual-purpose dog to our department will provide assistance in the following areas: location of drugs/narcotics in vehicle and building searches, criminal tracking and apprehension, locating lost or endangered citizens, officer protection and informational programs (including educational programs at areas schools) to build community relations. The Pitcairn Police Department believes it is important for the community to understand what your donation will fund. The following list must be purchased to start the K9 Unit: Dual Purpose Police K9, K9 Handler Course and Certification, Necessary Equipment for the K9, Vehicle Insert for Transportation, and Kennel Construction Materials. If you are able to support our K9 Unit in any way, any donation would be greatly appreciated. Donations can be made in any matter and checks should be made out to the Pitcairn Police Department with K9 Fund in the memo to assure your donation is placed in the proper account. Donations are tax deductible, therefore, please provide the Pitcairn Police Department with your name, address, and phone number and we will ensure you receive a proper receipt for documentation.
